

AMENDED AND RESTATED ORDER OF THE HEALTH OFFICER FOR THE COUNTY OF SHASTA

CONVENING AN ADVISORY COMMITTEE TO ADVISE THE HEALTH OFFICER ON IMPLEMENTING ANY MODIFICATIONS TO THE GOVERNOR'S STAY AT HOME ORDER CONSISTENT WITH GUIDANCE FROM THE GOVERNOR

**DATE OF ORDER: April 20, 2020
Amended April 28, 2020**

Please read this Order carefully. Violation of or failure to comply with this Order is a crime punishable by fine, imprisonment, or both. (California Health and Safety Code § 120295)

WHEREAS, a state of emergency has been declared by the State of California, and both a local health emergency and local emergency has been declared in the County of Shasta (the "County") in response to the COVID-19 pandemic; and

WHEREAS, in the County as well as throughout California and the nation, there are insufficient quantities of critical healthcare infrastructure, including hospital beds, ventilators and workers, capable of adequately treating mass numbers of patients at a single time – should the virus spread unchecked; and

WHEREAS, in direct response to that lack of healthcare infrastructure, governments across the nation are taking actions to slow the spread of COVID-19 in order to "flatten the curve" of infection and reduce the numbers of individuals infected at any one time by minimizing situations where the virus can spread; and

WHEREAS, in furtherance of this effort, on March 19, 2020, Governor Newsom issued Executive Order N-33-20, and the State Public Health Officer also issued an order, requiring all persons residing in the State to remain in their homes or places of residence, except as needed to maintain the continuity of operations for critical infrastructure (the "Stay-at-Home Order"); and

WHEREAS, the Governor has provided a framework for the potential revision and relaxation of the "Stay-at-Home Order," which would be guided by science and public health; and

WHEREAS, the Governor pointed to six general factors for modifying the "Stay-at-Home Order," as follows:

- The ability to monitor and protect our communities through testing, contact tracing, isolating, and supporting those who are positive or exposed;
- The ability to prevent infection in people who are at risk for more severe COVID-19;
- The ability of the hospital and health systems to handle surges;
- The ability to develop therapeutics to meet the demand;
- The ability for businesses, schools, and child care facilities to support physical distancing; and
- The ability to determine when to reinstitute certain measures, such as the stay-at-home orders, if necessary; and

WHEREAS, the Governor has stated that there is not a precise timeline for modifying the Stay-at-Home Order, but that these six indicators will serve as the framework for that decision; and

WHEREAS, the County Health Officer has determined that convening an advisory committee would provide assistance to the County Health Officer in implementing any action by the Governor to modify the Stay-at-Home Order; and

WHEREAS, the County Health Officer therefore issues the following:

NOW, THEREFORE, UNDER THE AUTHORITY OF CALIFORNIA HEALTH AND SAFETY CODE SECTIONS 101040, 101085, AND 120175, TITLE 17 CALIFORNIA CODE OF REGULATIONS SECTION 2501, THE HEALTH OFFICER OF THE COUNTY OF SHASTA (“HEALTH OFFICER”) ORDERS as follows:

1. A local Health Officer Advisory Committee, known as the “Roadmap to Recovery Advisory Committee,” is hereby convened to provide advice, input, and recommendations to the Health Officer, on implementing any decision by the Governor to modify the Stay-at-Home Order. The Roadmap to Recovery Advisory Committee may be referred to as the Advisory Committee for the purposes of this Order.
2. The Advisory Committee shall consist of the following persons:
 - a. The Shasta County Executive Officer
 - b. The Redding City Manager
 - c. The Anderson City Manager
 - d. The Shasta Lake City Manager
 - e. A representative from law enforcement [or justice](#) determined by the County Health Officer
 - f. A representative from the Shasta County Office of Education as determined by the County Health Officer
 - g. A representative from the health care community as determined by the County Health Officer
 - h. A representative from the business community as determined by the County Health Officer.
 - i. A representative from the faith community as determined by the County Health Officer.
 - j. A representative from the Shasta County Public Health Advisory Board as determined by the County Health Officer.
 - k. [A representative from Redding Rancheria as determined by the County Health Officer.](#)
 - l. [A representative from the Pit River Tribe as determined by the County Health Officer.](#)
3. The Advisory Committee shall serve solely in an advisory capacity to the Health Officer. It is not the responsibility or within the authority of the Advisory Committee to make decisions, manage, or direct, the implementation of any modifications of the Stay-at-Home Order.
4. This Order shall be effective immediately and will remain in effect until further Order of the Health Officer.
5. This Order is issued in accordance with, and incorporates by reference:
 - a. The March 4, 2020 Proclamation of a State of Emergency issued by Governor Gavin Newsom;
 - b. The March 17, 2020 Declaration of Local Health Emergency and the March 17, 2020 Declaration of a Local Emergency based on an imminent and proximate threat to public health from the introduction of novel COVID-19 in Shasta County;

- c. The March 24, 2020 Resolution of the Board of Supervisors of the County of Shasta ratifying the Declaration of a Local Health Emergency due to COVID-19;
 - d. The March 24, 2020 Resolution of the Board of Supervisors of the County of Shasta ratifying the Declaration of a Local Emergency due to COVID-19;
 - e. Governor Newsom's Executive Order N-33-20 of March 19, 2020 ordering all persons to stay at home to protect the health and well-being of all Californians and to establish consistency across the state in order to slow the spread of COVID-19.
 - f. Governor Newsom's outline of six critical indicators the State will consider before modifying the Stay-at-Home Order and other COVID-19 interventions.
6. This Order is made in accordance with all applicable State and Federal laws, including but not limited to: Health and Safety Code sections 101040, 101085, and 120175, Title 17 California Code of Regulations section 2501.
 7. To the extent necessary, pursuant to Government Code sections 26602 and 41601 and Health and Safety Code section 101029, the Health Officer requests that the Sheriff and all Chiefs of Police in the County ensure compliance with and enforcement of this Order.
 8. Copies of this Order shall promptly be: (1) made available at the County of Shasta Administration Center located at 1450 Court Street, Suite 308A; (2) posted on the County of Shasta Public Health Department's website (shastaready.org); and (3) provided to any member of the public requesting a copy of this Order.
 9. If any provision of this Order to the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held to be invalid, the remainder of this Order, including the application of such part or provision to other persons or circumstances, shall not be affected and shall continue in full force and effect. To this end, the provisions of this Order are severable.
