Meeting Overview

The meeting was called to order at 2:34 p.m. A quorum was present. Introductions were made.

Public Comment

Jackie Durant read an article covering the topic of justice. She read portions of the article/blog. The article covered how the topic of justice has evolved over time.

Greg Hector shared his daughter's story and her involvement in the Shasta County Criminal Justice System. He said she is scheduled to turn herself into the jail on Friday. He discussed his desire to have his daughter receive treatment while in jail. He mentioned having pods designated in the jail with treatment and mentioned the book Dreamland. He also addressed medicated assisted treatment within the jail. He read a prepared statement.

Approval of Meeting Minutes

Tracie noted a quorum was present.

During review of the minutes, Donnell noted a citizen had arrived and wanted to make a comment during public comment. Greg Hector made a public comment.

Jeff Gorder moved to approve the December 14, 2016 meeting minutes. Melissa Fowler-Bradley seconded the motion. Motion Passed: 7 Ayes, 0 Noes, 1 Abstention (Dean True).

The other minutes were not voted on due to no quorum.

Financial Report

AB 109 Public Safety Realignment revenue

Elaine Grossman distributed a *FY 17/18 Revenue* handout and stated that the 6th payment was received and revenues are on target for the year. Handout does not include growth.

Announcements and General Discussion

Executive Committee Activity

Tracie Neal discussed the Executive Committee Activity since December 13, 2017. She stated in January they approved meeting dates for 2018, reviewed and approved CCP bylaws, and had a preliminary budget discussion. In February they had further budget discussions and approved the fiscal year 2018/19 budget, allocation and percentage distributions.

Compliance Team

Tom Bosenko stated that there is a compliance team but due to staffing this last year they had to move them back to patrol. As soon as there is staffing the team will be reestablished. He stated the Sheriff's Office, in 2017, for AB 109/Post Release Community Supervision (PRCS) offenders, had 100 contacts, 100 searches, and 31 arrests; for Probationers they had 237 contacts, 10 attempted contacts, 246 searches, and 55 arrests (arrests could be for others associated with probationer); for Parole they had 28 contacts, 1 attempted contact, 28 searches, and 7 arrests.

Bill Schueller distributed the *Arrestees on Probation* handout and stated that he did not have numbers for attempted contacts and that the Compliance Team disbanded in 2016. Compliance is done by patrol officers. He indicated that the current data is based on information from their RMS which is not always accurate. The data is based on arrests for 2017. The arrests are made by the neighborhood Policing Unit (NPU), investigations, and patrol. He could not distinguish between informal and formal probationers. He stated there were 3090 arrests for some type of violations, probation or PRCS, and this number includes 180 parole violations. Out of the total number 3090, he said 867 were individuals that were repeatedly arrested accounting for 31%. Out of these, 268 were on formal supervision. Schueller discussed a few recent press releases involving PRCS offenders. Tom Bosenko stated that the jail is impacted by probation violations. He provided a data sheet and indicated 1/3 of bookings are related to a violation.

Jeff Gorder asked for clarification about when the law enforcement compliance teams ended and when they may be restarted. Both Tom Bosenko and Bill Schuller discussed staffing issues and their desire to be involved in compliance.

Donnell Ewert asked specific questions regarding compliance and asked for law enforcement to explain what initiates a compliance check. He asked if probation provides a list or if the people they contact in their normal course of business just happen to be on probation. Tom Bosenko discussed how compliance worked as a team and how it works now with patrol officers. He also discussed the CAD system and how officers can note the types of contacts they have in the field.

Donnell Ewert asked for clarification on CCP funds allocated to law enforcement for compliance and what the dollars are used for. Tom Bosenko indicated 1 sergeant, 2 deputies and the RPD officer. Erin Ceccarelli said the next fiscal year includes \$706,000. Executive members discussed compliance efforts this last year.

Tracie confirmed that probation uses their compliance allocation as described in the CCP Plan. Elaine Grossman asked for clarification on the purpose and goals of the compliance team and outcome measures. Tracie referenced the CCP plan and identified page 21 and read from the subsection on compliance team efforts.

Chelsey Chappelle and Sarah Zorn were introduced. Sarah is the Deputy Probation Officer assigned full time to compliance efforts. Chelsey Chappelle stated that Probation's goal for compliance was to support and reinforce terms and conditions. She distributed the *Compliance Contacts* handout and stated that of these contacts, 58% were attempted or unsuccessful contacts, of those 43% resulted in a later arrest or warrant and 12% reported after the attempted contact. She stated that 42% of the contacts were with offenders in the field: 37% were in compliance, 15%

were transported, 22% were arrested, and 26% were directed to report to probation and/or treatment. She stated that the compliance officer has a unique role of assisting the other probation staff with those offenders that may not be in compliance as well as helping to support and reinforce those who are doing well. She stated that they do not expect to find offenders out of compliance with every attempted contact and not every attempted or unsuccessful contact results in a follow-up action. She stated that the compliance officer assists with transports to Court after failures to appear (FTA); assists with locating and arresting those whose GPS units have died; took one offender to Mental Health who was later 5150'd and assessed by Mental Health staff; transports offenders from jail to the Community Corrections Center (CCC) upon release to ensure offender makes that initial contact with their Probation Officer; transports offenders to treatment centers needed to get offender back into compliance; and verifies offender residences.

Probation's compliance process was discussed by Sarah Zorn, Chelsey Chappelle, Jeff Gorder, and Danielle Gehrung.

Compliance efforts and structure were discussed at length by the Executive Committee.

A workgroup to grasp the concept of the Compliance Team or to change the CCP plan in regards to Compliance was discussed by Tom Bosenko, Donnell Ewert, Jeff Gorder, and Tracie Neal. An ad-hoc workgroup with a captain from the Sheriff's Office, Bill Schueller, and Chelsey Chappelle will discuss and report back.

Action Items

There were no action items.

Operational Updates

Danielle Gehrung stated that the Day Reporting Center is having their 5-year anniversary in April, and there will be a celebration on April 19th from 1-4pm.

Tom Bosenko stated that the jail's average daily population has taken a slight dip and is at 90% capacity. Tom reported on jail statistics.

Tracie Neal stated that probation will have the Probation Data Sheet available on a monthly basis. Donnell Ewert asked questions about the total adult supervision population and specifically asked about the realigned population. Tracie Neal clarified the population under supervision. Tracie Neal stated that she recently pulled the total number of PRCS offenders the county has received since realignment started and the county has received about 1400 PRCS offenders. The county has had about 340 mandatory supervision offenders since realignment started. Donnell Ewert asked for recidivism numbers on the total population. Melissa Fowler-Bradley asked if probation tracks recidivism by conviction or arrest. She discussed the court calendar impacts. Donnell Ewert asked about Shasta's Most Wanted and the sentencing process. Melissa Fowler-Bradley discussed efforts to locate defendant's pending sentencing, failure to appears, impacts on the court system, and multiple cases. She discussed the Marshall's Office efforts. The executive committee had a lengthy conversation about the court process, Shasta's Most Wanted, and failure to appears and how these impact the community and the criminal justice system. Melissa Fowler-Bradley reported the failure

to appear rates to be about 33-38%. Tracie Neal stated that they would talk about FTA's on a future agenda.

Chelsey Chappelle stated that the Probation Department has started a pilot program involving the CDCR video conferencing with offenders prior to release. She continued by stating that the CCC now has an alcohol and drug counselor.

Input for next agenda

Tracie Neal stated that Tom Wright has retired and that there will be an action item at the next CCP advisory committee meeting to replace him on the committee. Christy Wright stated that she would like to nominate herself.

Meeting Schedules

Tracie Neal stated that the next meeting will be an Executive Committee meeting on April 18th at City Hall in the Caldwell Park Conference Room.

Adjourn

Tom Bosenko motioned to adjourn. Jeff Gorder seconded the motion. Motion passed: 8 Ayes, 0 Noes.
