CAL FIRE Suspends Burn Permits in Shasta and Eastern Trinity Counties

Redding – While recent rains this winter and spring have been a welcome sight in California, drought conditions continue to increase fire danger in the region prompting CAL FIRE to suspend all burn permits for outdoor residential burning within the State Responsibility Area of Shasta and Eastern Trinity Counties. This suspension takes effect **June 20, 2016** and bans all residential outdoor burning of landscape debris like branches and leaves.

"Creating and maintaining defensible space is very important to protect your home in the event of a wildfire. We appreciate our local resident's commitment to being prepared and fire safe when they are working outdoors with powered equipment in these dry conditions," said Chief Mike Hebrard, Shasta-Trinity Unit Chief.

This suspension is for all State Responsibility Areas within the counties of Shasta and Eastern Trinity. In Shasta County, residential burning on lands protected by the Shasta County Fire Department is also banned. Agricultural, training, campfire permits and vegetation control burns conducted under permit are not affected by this suspension.

"As conditions across California are drying out further we must take every step to prevent new wildfires from sparking," said Chief Ken Pimlott, CAL FIRE director. "Residents must ensure they have Defensible Space by removing dead trees and overgrown vegetation from around their homes, but do so safely."

Since January 1, 2016, CAL FIRE and firefighters across the state have already responded to over 1,900 wildfires that have burned over 30,000 acres. In the CAL FIRE Shasta-Trinity Unit, firefighters have responded to 58 wildfires. While outdoor burning of landscape debris by homeowners is no longer allowed, CAL FIRE is asking residents to ensure that they are prepared for wildfires by maintaining a minimum of 100 feet of Defensible Space around every home.

Here are some tips to help prepare your home and property:

- Clear all dead or dying vegetation 100 feet around all structures
- Landscape with fire resistant/drought tolerant plants
- Find alternative ways to dispose of landscape debris like chipping or hauling it to a biomass energy facility

The department may issue restricted temporary burning permits if there is an essential reason due to public health and safety. Agriculture, land management, fire training, and other industrial-type burning may proceed if a CAL FIRE official inspects the burn site and issues a special permit.

The suspension of burn permits for residential landscape debris does not apply to campfires within organized campgrounds or on private property. Campfires may be permitted if the campfire is maintained in such a manner as to prevent its spread to the wildland.
