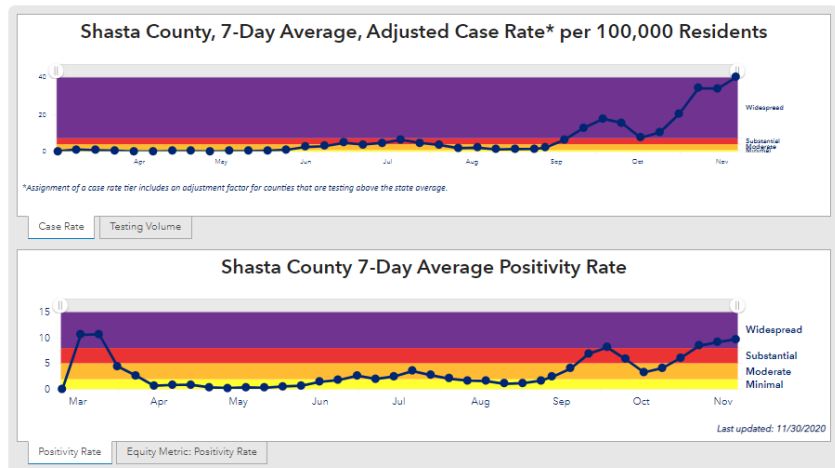

### CURRENT SITUATION

- We had a total of 245 cases on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, including 109 men, 132 women and 4 people of unknown gender:

- 2 children under age 13
- 26 teenagers
- 42 people in their 20s
- 40 people in their 30s
- 33 people in their 40s
- 44 people in their 50s
- 31 people in their 60s
- 18 people in their 70s
- 4 people in their 80s
- 4 people over age 89
- 1 person of unknown age



- Shasta County remains in the purple (“widespread”) tier. Our adjusted case rate increased from 33.8 to 39.8 daily cases per 100,000 residents, exceeding the purple tier limit of 7.0. The actual case rate is 62.9, but it was adjusted down because the county’s per capita testing volume is higher than the state average. Our positivity rate increased from 9.1% to 9.7%. - About the data:** Active cases are an undercount because of delays due to the Thanksgiving holiday. Active cases, in isolation, in quarantine, and released from isolation numbers are estimates, because Public Health cannot complete one-on-one case investigation and contact tracing on all cases. - The majority of recent cases have been people with symptoms – 91% in September, 90% in October and 93% in November. The most common symptoms have been cough, headache, fever and muscle aches.
