CURRENT SITUATION

- We had a total of 114 cases on Tuesday, including 57 men, 54 women and 3 people of unknown gender:
 - 4 children under age 13
 - 9 teenagers
 - 15 people in their 20s
 - 23 people in their 30s
 - 18 people in their 40s
 - 17 people in their 50s
 - 16 people in their 60s
 - 5 people in their 70s
 - 6 people in their 80s
 - 1 person over age 89
- This report represents an update to our total case numbers, as we have been conducting case investigations to correct reported cases that were duplicates or out-of-county records.
- If you've received a positive test result, please isolate yourself and notify your close contacts. Don't wait for someone to contact you with instructions. If you do not develop symptoms, your isolation period ends 10 days after your first positive test. If you do develop symptoms, isolation ends 10 days after your symptoms began, and your symptoms are improving, and you've been fever-free without medication for at least 24 hours. If you are feeling better and are fever-free, you must still isolate for the full 10 days. Detailed information can be found on ShastaReady.org.
- Question: I'm an employer. What should I do if an employee tests positive? Answer: Send the employee home, and notify all workers who were within 6 feet of the person for at least 15 minutes, making every effort to protect that person's confidentiality. Provide quarantine instructions and testing information to all close contacts. Report the case to Cal/OSHA within 8 hours of learning about the illness if the person was hospitalized. If there are three or more cases in the workplace within a two-week period, report this to Public Health. The business doesn't necessarily need to close.
