



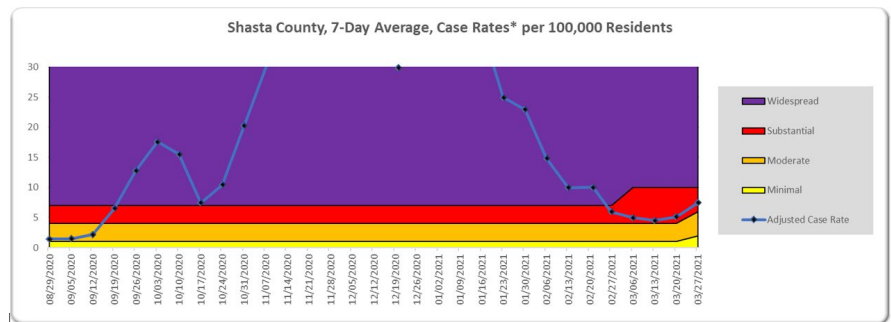
# COVID-19 INCIDENT UPDATE: April 6, 2021

## CURRENT SITUATION

- We had 25 cases Sunday and Monday, including 9 men and 16 women:
  - 1 child under age 13
  - 2 teenagers
  - 5 people in their 20s
  - 1 person in their 30s
  - 1 person in their 40s
  - 7 people in their 50s
  - 2 people in their 60s
  - 1 person in their 70s
  - 1 person in their 80s
  - 2 people over age 89
  - 2 people of unknown age



- Vaccine availability expands:** All Shasta County residents age 16 and older are eligible for vaccine now. The Pfizer vaccine is the only brand that is approved for use for ages 16-17, and a parent must be present when their child is vaccinated. - Shasta County remains in the red (“substantial”) tier. Our adjusted case rate increased again, from 5.1 to 7.4 daily cases per 100,000 residents. Our positivity rate also increased, from 1.8% to 2.7%. The state changed its thresholds for each tier today, because the goal of administering 4 million vaccine doses to the hardest-hit communities statewide has been met. This allows for higher case rates in the red, orange and yellow tiers.
- Because the county’s case rate now exceeds 7 per 100,000, weekly testing is now required for youth football. Testing is already happening for indoor youth sports.
- With more than 20 million vaccine doses administered and hospitalizations continuing to decline statewide, Governor Gavin Newsom announced today that California will move beyond the Blueprint for a Safer Economy on June 15 if two criteria are met: If vaccine supply is sufficient and if hospitalization rates are stable and low. If that happens, everyday activities will be allowed and businesses can open with risk reduction measures, including requiring masks and encouraging vaccination.
