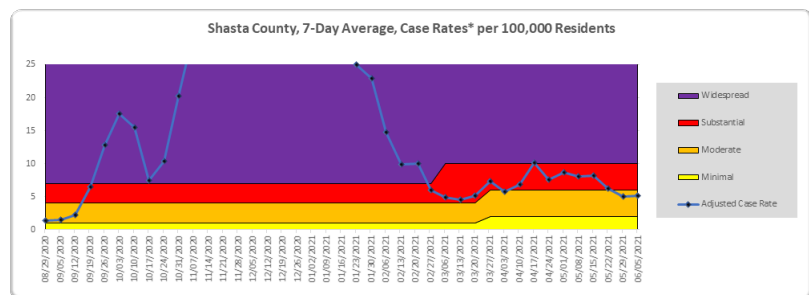

CURRENT SITUATION

- We had 31 cases Sunday and Monday, including 15 men and 16 women:
 - 3 children under age 13
 - 3 teenagers
 - 4 people in their 20s
 - 5 people in their 30s
 - 1 person in their 40s
 - 11 people in their 50s
 - 2 people in their 60s
 - 1 person in their 80s
 - 1 person of unknown age

- We are sorry to report a death today. The patient was a woman in her 70s.
- Shasta County would move to the orange (“moderate”) tier, if the tier system were to continue. Our adjusted case rate is now 5.14 daily cases per 100,000 residents, and our positivity rate is 2.6 percent.



- As we transition Beyond the Blueprint, we will no longer be issuing daily incident updates to report COVID-19 statistics. We will report new cases, hospitalizations and deaths every Wednesday on our website and social media, and we will continue to keep the public updated with other important news.
- Question:** What happens when California moves [Beyond the Blueprint](#) on June 15? **Answer:** Restaurants, shopping malls, movie theaters, and most everyday places will be open as normal, with no capacity limits or social distancing required. This does not apply to schools, health care settings and some other public settings. Some public health measures will remain for mega events (5,000+ people indoors or 10,000+ outdoors). Masks will still be required indoors for unvaccinated people, and employees are still required to follow CalOSHA’s masking guidelines. California will keep a close eye on vaccination and infection rates over the summer and keep these guidelines in place until at least October 1, 2021.
